Letter to Colleagues

Community College Update

From Mark Puterbaugh Davidson County Community College Member-At-Large, Community Colleges

Progress continues on the Data Warehouse and Information Systems for the Future projects. For the Data Warehouse project, Phase I is still on track to be completed by June 30, 2001. Two of the major objectives of Phase I are to get the computer hardware and software systems in place, and to migrate most of the existing state level data to the Data Warehouse environment. Another objective of Phase I is to train two skilled knowledge workers from each college during May and June of 2001 on Business Objects, the Online Analytical Processing (OLAP) system. Information for these training classes will be distributed in April.


Phase II of the project will begin in April of 2001 and will last approximately one year. It will involve incorporating additional existing data systems (Literacy, GED, High School Graduate Performance Report, Developmental Studies Tracking) and determining the feasibility of developing system designs for four other areas that are strictly conceptual at this time (Faculty and Staff Compensation Information System, Student Employment, College Budgeting, and Curriculum Program Cost System).

Regarding the college Information Systems for the Future project, work is in progress to begin implementation at the eight pilot colleges. The Financial Services component is scheduled to be implemented in July 2001. All other functions (Student Records, Continuing Education, and Human Resources) will follow during the succeeding 12 months. The remaining 50 colleges and the Textile Center will begin the migration process in FY 2002, with 25 colleges per year converting to the new system.

Meeting of NCICU

From Robert Springer Elon College Member-at-Large, Private Institutions

The North Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities held a meeting on December 15, 2000 at High Point University. Institutional researchers from nine private institutions attended the meeting. Bennett College, Chowan College, Duke University, Elon College, Greensboro College, Louisburg College, Mars Hill College, Pfeiffer University, and Wake Forest University were represented. The following topics were covered at the meeting including the new SACS criteria (to take effect in 2004), online fact books, IPEDS online, consortia, data sharing, and IR issues at small institutions. Participants found the meeting to be a good forum for sharing interests, ideas and concerns.
