Enrollment & Revenue Projection Models:

Establishing a Critical Foundation for Strategic Planning and Institutional Research

Enrollment projections are a critical source of information for administrators as they consider revenues, buildings, parking, meal plans, and other issues related to strategic planning, budgeting, and capacity. This workshop will take a nuts and bolts approach in its presentation of strategies for setting up an enrollment and revenue projection model within a broader enrollment and strategic planning framework. The workshop will blend lecture, discussion, and group work. Participants will need to have some experience with Microsoft Excel.

- ➤ False Expectations & Cautionary Tales

Presenter Biographies:

Raymond Barclay

Dr. Raymond Barclay brings a wealth of higher education, strategic planning, and assessment and analysis experiences from a diversity of sectors including the UNC-system, a private higher education foundation, a very selective liberal arts college, and a community college. Currently, Dr. Barclay is the director of the Office of Institutional Research and Planning within the Chancellor's Division at Western Carolina University (WCU). In this role, Dr. Barclay serves as the chair of the Space Planning Committee and the Enrollment Projections Committee but also serves on several other campus-based committees such as the SACS Leadership Committee, Strategic Planning Council, QEP Committee, UNC-Tomorrow Campus Task Force, and the Executive Enrollment Management Committee. Additionally, he is currently serving as a member of the University of North Carolina's Retention and Graduation Advisory and Survey Work Groups.

Before arriving at WCU, Dr. Barclay served as the Director of Institutional Research and Assessment and reported to the Provost at the College of New Jersey where he founded The Institute for Education Design, Evaluation & Assessment (IeDEA) under the Office of Institutional Research & Assessment. Prior to TCNJ, Dr. Barclay reported to the President and oversaw policy and planning while at Burlington County College (Mount Laurel/Pemberton, NJ) and was Director of Research and Planning for the Corella and Bertram F. "Bonner" Foundation (Princeton, NJ).

Dr. Barclay has also been active as an evaluation and planning consultant for several New Jersey nonprofit and government agencies and has also taught psychology, testing and measurement, and public policy courses over the years. Dr. Barclay completed his Ph.D. in educational psychology at Temple University. Research interests include cognition, neuroscience, problem solving, linear, logistic, hierarchical, and structural equation modeling, and survey development. He also holds an MDIV from Princeton Theological Seminary, completed graduate coursework (Public Policy & Federalism) at Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School of Public Policy, and holds a BA (Summa Cum Laude) from Indiana University of Pennsylvania where he majored in philosophy and minored in Anthropology.

Alan Socha, Business and Technology Applications Analyst within the Office of Institutional Research and Planning, will be assisting Dr. Barclay in conducting the session. Mr. Socha's role with the office is to maintain a SAS report library, assist the director of assessment, assist in identifying criteria for program and unit reviews, assist in analyzing data to support strategic enrollment development, support strategic planning and institutional effectiveness, respond to ad hoc requests, assist the director of Institutional Research and Planning, provide committee support, provide statistical support, and complete and analyze survey and student systems data. Mr. Socha attended The College of New Jersey (TCNJ) where he majored in Mathematical Statistics and minored in Computer Science and Economics. He is currently pursuing a master's degree at Western Carolina in General Experimental Psychology with a focus in methods.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS

From Winston-Salem: (40 East / North 85 Business)

Travel on Interstate 40 East to Greensboro. Once in Greensboro, continue on Business 85 North to Old Exit #127, now exit 39 (Highway 29 North, Reidsville Exit). Take Exit 39 onto HWY 29 North. Remain on HWY 29 North for approx. four miles. Take the West Market Street / N.C. A&T University Exit. Once you exit, yield to the right on Market Street. At the second stoplight, turn right on Benbow Road. Craig Hall is the last building on the left.

From Charlotte (North 85 Business)

Travel on Interstate North 85 Business until you reach the city of Greensboro. Once in Greensboro, continue on I-85 North to Old Exit #127, now exit 39 (Highway 29 North, Reidsville Exit). Take Exit 39 onto HWY 29 North. Remain on HWY 29 North for approx. four miles. Take the West Market Street / N.C. A&T University Exit. Once you exit, yield to the right on Market Street. At the second stoplight, turn right on Benbow Road. Craig Hall is the last building on the left.

From Durham (Business 85 S/40 W)

Travel on Business 85 South / 40 West to Greensboro. Once in Greensboro, take Old Exit #128 now exit 41 (Lee Street Exit). Bear right and continue on Lee Street approximately 2.7 miles. Turn right on Benbow Road. Travel on Benbow Road for .8 mile until reaching the Market Street intersection/stoplight. Cross over Market Street and Craig Hall will be the last building on your left.

From Reidsville (29 S)

Follow Highway 29 South into the city of Greensboro. Once in Greensboro, continue to follow 29 south for approximately six miles. Take the West Market St. / A&T University Exit. Turn right on Market Street. At the first stoplight, turn right on Benbow Road. Craig Hall is the last building on your left.

From Martinsville (220 S)

Follow Highway 220 South into Greensboro. Once in Greensboro, 220 South turns into Battleground Rd. Continue on Battleground until reaching the Wendover Avenue East Exit. Take the Wendover East Ave. Exit and drive for approximately 4 miles. Turn right on Lindsay Street. At the second stoplight, turn left on Sullivan Street. Drive approx. two and one-half blocks on Sullivan St. to Benbow Rd. Turn right on Benbow Road. Craig Hall is the first building on the right.
